PROTEST AGAINST THE DEFENCE & SECURITY EXPO

In this, its third year, the Defence & Security Expo at the Three Counties Showground has doubled in size, with the addition of a 'Special Products Industry Day' (16th July), previously held at the defence college at Shrivenham - so Malvern Individuals for Peace was back in action! This time we had help from Rebecca of the Hereford Peace Council and Ade of Worcester Meeting, who is our Area Meeting representative on the Quaker Roots of Resistance group (formed to plan actions against the DSEI Arms Fair this September in London).

A look at the exhibitors section of the Expo's website www.3cdse.co.uk reveals BAE Systems, amongst others on the CAAT blacklist, along with some of their products. Closer scrutiny makes clear that the main purpose of this event is to recruit small and medium enterprises into the defence and security industry. The website boasted that delegates would have access to 2000 'decision makers', and 150+ exhibitors, although we have no way of knowing whether these numbers were achieved. Security had been dramatically increased with attendance limited to 'industry' members and those intending to supply industry/military/law enforcement agencies. 'Our' prospective delegate was therefore unable to register because of this new requirement for everyone to have current security clearance.

Driving past the Showground that morning, to check which Gate was being used, cars were backing up on the Hanley Road as all were searched on entry; this even happened at the end of the day when cars drove in to collect people at the end of the day.

Now to the elements of our protest on Wed 17th: At 2pm Friends from three Meetings and local supporters met at Barnards Green, with banners and placards, and held a vigil round the trees. We then marched through the village and on to Qinetiq, which has recently signed a partnership agreement with Saudi Arabia. Here Dick Stockford read out his moving testimony (reproduced below this report) and a wreath was attached to their main roadside sign, in memory of young children killed in the Yemeni conflict. A surprised Qinetiq employee emerged and was invited to listen.



From there, lifts were provided to the Showground exit gate on Hanley Rd and, facing the delegates' cars as they left, we formed a line displaying our messages, these included:

- Malvern Showground Welcomes Arms Traders - NOT IN OUR NAME
- Quakers Say: Use your Technology to Heal our World
- Quakers Say: Use your Skills to Tackle the Climate Emergency.

Meanwhile Malvern Pagans were staging their own witness up in town, near the Elgar statue. Ian Woodcock informed us: *Early afternoon we laid flowers at the Malvinha Spring, with a notice that they were for all those harmed by Malvern's support for the arms trade. Elgar was given some paper darts with ' Fly Darts not Drones' printed on them. We also performed with peace songs and affirmations in the presence of some supportive well water fillers.*

The end of the day did not mean the end of the activity. Signatures have been collected to accompany an Open Letter to the Showground Board of Trustees. Now that around forty people have signed, an appointment will be made with the CEO of the Showground to hand-deliver it, as last year, which enables us to have a meeting with him. There is also the need to spread the word; Rebecca has informed CAAT and the Malvern Gazette has published a much reduced version of the information they were sent, accompanied by a full justification from the industry. This in turn has prompted a spirited response from our side on the Gazette website and a couple of letters submitted by Tony and Dick, so we wait to see if either of these are published.

We see this Expo as a further stage in the militarisation of the UK as these secretive events are on the increase – just at a time when our best technical brains are so badly needed to address the climate emergency. As long as this Expo continues, so shall our witness.

DICK STOCKFORD'S TESTIMONY OUTSIDE QINETIQ

“We are at the gates of the Malvern Technology Centre.

This is the Development Centre for Qinetiq who are Arms dealers, the 5th largest in Britain. They don't produce arms here, the job of the Centre is to provide the data information and communications to guide the weapons that kill the enemy. This is the job of Qinetiq whatever their website may say and it's our job to name the truth because these weapons kill millions of innocent world citizens every year. All of this is supported by a licensing system run badly by our Government who pay scant regard for how the weapons are used by the unscrupulous countries who buy them.

This is why the unprecedented achievement of CAAT in persuading the Appeal Court to deem arms sales to Saudi Arabia, as unlawful is so important. This could be a tipping point ruling and particularly so for Qinetiq who have just signed a partnership deal with Saudi Arabia. But this ruling has come too late to save the 35,000 children under 5 who have died in the Republic of Yemen where the civil war is stoked by arms Qinetiq and others sell to Saudi Arabia.

So we remember those children who have not lived to fulfil their potential in the hope that those who made these arms will in future, use their undoubted skills and vital technology to heal our world and overcome the climate emergency.


News from Friends House: The Arms Fair in London

We (Eoin, Jonathan and I) shared a pergola with Extinction Rebellion at West Fest on 29th June. We had information on the Friends and specifically on the recent initiative "Active Peace Education in Malvern." (APEM) This is a six session program for primary age children in Malvern which Liz Flanagan and Rosemary Webb have initiated for the Friends of Malvern. Two programmes, "Child Rights" and "Self Esteem" have been created and three more to follow.

It was a very hot day, the sky was blue, the music too and loudly coming from three directions. To me active peace is illustrated in festivals, where celebrating the wonder of being human and savouring the skills, ideas and creativity flourish. Our pergola provided a little sanctuary from the heat but not the volumes of mixed sounds. It was a great day of fusions and encounters conversations and joy.



I had brought examples of the activities from our "Self Esteem" program to share with the Fest Fans:

1. Fomo to Jomo (Fear Of Missing Out to Joy Of Missing Out)

An opportunity to reflect on real needs and what you could live without. It is the first step of transition to a simpler life.

2. In the Shoes of Another

A set of exercises to explore how the body and mind interact to create a negative or positive sense of self.

3. Cheering up Cards

A design activity in which participants consider what words and images would be helpful in lifting the spirits of a friend or acquaintance who is troubled using all the elements of design colour, shape text and font. Well this was the plan!

Our Quaker presence enabled us to provide information, meeting parents and teachers and young couples who were interesting in finding out about the Quaker philosophy and way of life. Good close exchanges (they had to be close so we could be heard), took place in the cool oasis of the Friend's Pergola.

There is also a large number of books which are multiple copies of some titles. In this case it is recommended that only one copy should be kept with the exception of very popular titles. Given our space constraints these will be offered to other Quaker libraries, starting with the Friends House Library in London and the library at Woodbrooke.

I also wanted to let you know that a little while ago we had a very kind donation of five books to the library from the family of Barry Barber. We are very grateful to them for this donation.

If there are particular books you would like to see in the library, please let me know – and don't forget that you can search through the current catalogue on the web site. There is also a list of recent accessions.

Advices & Queries No 25

A long-term relationship brings tensions as well as fulfilment. Being Green (2). Developments in recycling

Malvern Hills District Council (MHDC) provides excellent guidance on what is recyclable by them and what is not. MHDC works together with Severn Waste which has a recycling centre at Norton (it has an Education Officer, why not organise a visit and see how it works?).

The wrong thing in the green bin/pink sack can mean a lorry load is unusable. Fortunately Malvern Hills has low levels of contamination. Some of this is sheer absent-mindedness, e.g.: clothing, coat-hangers (!), wood, saucepans, CDs, ink cartridges. (There are better places for all of these.) But food waste and nappies are – just evil.

The recent series of very informative emails from MHDC provides feedback and news about recycling. Recently they pointed out how few plastic items from bathrooms are recycled – why? They only need a minimal rinse. Cleaning products with “triggers” can go straight into the r/c. Those with pump tops need to have the top unscrewed and put in the black bag.

The major No-Nos are: paper/card with glitter, bows and ribbons (tear it all off!), shredded paper (it gets mixed up with the glass and spoils it) and plastic sticky tape and Post-Its (jam the machines). No black items either - the machine can't see them!

Positive tips are: put the tops back on plastic drinks bottles (the fork-lift driver loves popping them!) and glass bottles (but only if you have a green bin).
