Malvern Quakers have been collecting regularly for Farmers Overseas Action Group and are currently supporting sponsorship for a girl called Rovia Owachira. FOAG is an independent charity whose mission is to aid social and economic development in Uganda's rural communities. It provides support to 12 projects in four key sectors; health, education, economic empowerment and the environment, with the overall goal of alleviating poverty. They concentrate on small scale constructive action for community development through the funding of innovative projects that are often too small for the objectives of larger international charities. It was founded in 1981 by a nucleus of Worcestershire farming families to practically address the needs of Uganda's agricultural development.

Prison worship group

The Quaker worship group is greatly valued at Long Lartin, in the bleak surroundings of a high security prison. We continue to welcome men from both the mainstream and vulnerable prisoner populations, along with those who have chosen solitary confinement for their own safety. Each time I have attended (usually once a month) it is noticeable how hard the Quaker Chaplains have to work to ensure that everyone on their list is escorted to the classroom where we meet.

Everyone is deeply respectful and the warm handshake that each prisoner offers to all those present on entering the room will contrast with the wariness and care necessary to negotiate the difficult relationships and power structures in prison life. Two men are now ploughing through Quaker Faith and Practice, all are ready to enter into conversation, which takes place over tea after our half hour of quiet.

The Chaplains can bring in a few flowers; I observe how those present feast their eyes on this modest offering. I am all too aware of the complete lack of all aspects of nature in their lives - not a tree, plant or even blade of grass is visible from any part of the estate. The small memorial garden for prison officers is en route to the main building so only seen by staff (and inspectors). The anti-corruption, anti-grooming and anti-conditioning training I have now received (!) stresses how wary I must be in all interactions. But if we neglect their humanity, how can we begin to answer that of God within each one?

Meeting House Open Day (Tuesday 20 June 10-4)

This is the second year that we have held an open day during Malvern Civic Week, which is a “celebration of summer” arranged by Malvern Civic Society. We had a small display on Quaker history, spirituality and Quaker achievements, and the Meeting Room was set out as for a Quaker Meeting, with an explanation of Quaker Worship. There was an introductory talk at noon to which three people came.

Motivations were various: one person had discovered her ancestors were Quakers, another had visited the art exhibition and wanted to know more. One man had attended Meetings as a child in our small children’s room and brought his wife to see. Altogether we had seven visitors and some long conversations about Quaker life and values. The value of holding an open day during Civic Week is that the work of publicising our presence is done for us, and this event is arguably more fruitful than the customary Quaker Week which takes place each year in October.

A Review of “A Long Way Down” by Averil Stedeford

The title poem sets the tone for this recently published collection of poetry. It is simple, explicit and accessible yet contains personal and poignant truths. It was written when Averil and her husband had received the news *for this cancer nothing can be done*. The poem describes how her husband had been tempted to take a short cut to the *steep drop past jagged rocks*. Instead *holding close we re-pledged our love, thankful that we chose the long way down*.

I was touched by the reality of the *Shadow* reminding us that even a *happy man has a shadow*. *This stayed at home, fell on us*. And *One Loo Roll* and *Lonely* remind the reader of the reality of loss and widowhood for *only the NHS observes my nakedness*. The humour of *Double Delight* gives permission to all who grieve to enjoy ourselves too.

Section three contains the poems written while Averil was working at Sir Michael Sobell House in Oxford as a therapist and teacher of palliative care. *The Last Invitation* contains a wonderful simile of the inevitability of tides destroying the children’s sandcastles. Or *Does it destroy? Dare we believe it’s the last invitation to play?*

The poems inspired by a depressed patient *If Wheelchair were a Pram* and *New Wheels* remind us that the right equipment and support can lighten the last journey as *only the useless body went through the chapel door*.

The Red Hat resonated with me as I am sometimes told “No tears now” and I reply “I’ll cry if I want to. You’re worth it” knowing that trite advertising slogan never fails to irritate. The poem tells us that *your tears will be like water / a potter throws on clay / to ease the changing form*.

Her Christian theology is apparent in several poems but I found the most moving to be *The Priest* as a cup of tea given to a dying man becomes a memory of sacraments given and received.

I must own that Averil has befriended me and welcomed me to her room in her care home, looking up to the Malvern Hills. Often she has shared a poem and asked for my response, explaining how she came to write it. Her clear thinking mind cuts through some of my confused thinking and makes sense of my experiences.
